

3-2 MS Accounting with SUNY Binghamton

This academic program is open to students seeking the B.S. degree in Business Economics at SUNY-Oneonta and an M.S. in Accounting at SUNY-Binghamton, a school accredited by AACSB International—The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. The first three years are taken at Oneonta, the next two years at Binghamton, and the two degrees are awarded at appropriate times by the two institutions. Admission to Binghamton is not automatic. The principal eligibility factors are the undergraduate cumulative and major G.P.A. and the score achieved on the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT). The first year at Binghamton can be applied toward Oneonta's residency requirement, provided at least 30 credit hours have been completed at Oneonta.

4-1 with CLARKSON UNIVERSITY

A student who completes the required foundation courses listed below during his/her undergraduate years at Oneonta will be able to earn a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.) degree from Clarkson University with just one year of study at their Graduate School of Management, a school accredited by AACSB International—The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. Clarkson offers programs leading to an M.B.A. in Finance, Management Information Systems, Marketing, Operations Management, and Accounting, as well as an M.S. in Management Systems.

Admission to Clarkson is guaranteed if either of the following minimum standards is fulfilled:

1. A 3.0 GPA after 90 credits at SUCO and a 70th percentile score on the Graduate Management Admissions Test (GMAT). Satisfying this standard would entitle one to an early decision concerning admission and financial aid. The student would be notified early in his/her senior year.
2. A 3.0 GPA in the junior and senior year at SUCO combined with a 50th percentile score on the GMAT and at least a C in each of the foundation courses.

It requires completion of all SUCO graduation requirements (and receipt of the SUCO degree) before the student attends Clarkson.

4+1 with UNION UNIVERSITY

The Graduate College of Union University and SUNY Oneonta have established a 4+1 articulation agreement. Students who complete the SUNY Oneonta courses listed below with a B- or better may waive up to 8 courses in the Graduate College of Union University's MBA program upon acceptance. This would allow SUNY Oneonta students to complete their MBA degree in about one additional year after graduation from SUNY Oneonta.

Upon completion of the junior year, SUNY Oneonta students may be granted early admission into the MBA if they have achieved a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.4 and a GMAT score of 600 or above. Regular admissions applicants must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 and a GMAT score of 500 or above. Students with a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.5 in their senior year may waive the GMAT. GMAT scores are required however for students wishing to be considered for the top two financial aid scholarship levels.

The MBA program prepares students for analytical, managerial, and executive-level positions in a variety of enterprises. The design and delivery of the curriculum emphasize broad exposure to core business disciplines; the building of analytical, computer, communication, and human management skills; and the development of an ethical, systems-oriented, cross-functional perspective for decision making.

MBA study at The Graduate College is a very special experience. The Graduate College's first-rate faculty delivers a flexible, global curriculum within a "small college" environment with the opportunities of a strong global MBA. It is the Graduate College's size, and careful attention to the individual needs of each student that make graduate study such a rewarding experience. Small classes (average size 17) ensure that your education is not a "spectator sport." Almost all classes meet in the evening, enabling the Graduate School to bring full and part-time students, from all educational backgrounds, together in exciting and diversified ways. Faculty are routinely accessible outside of class for individual student questions and conversation.

Students must complete the SUNY Oneonta courses listed below with a grade of B- or above to waive the Graduate College equivalents in order to graduate from the MBA program in about one additional year.

4-1 with ROCHESTER INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

A student who completes the following course substitutions listed below during his/her undergraduate years at Oneonta may be able to earn a Master of Business Administration (M.B.A.) degree from Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) with just one year of study at their Graduate College of Business, a school accredited by AACSB International—The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. RIT offers programs leading to an M.B.A. in Finance, Management Information Systems, Marketing, Operations Management, and Accounting, as well as an M.S. in Management Systems.

- A maximum of 6 MBA foundation courses may be waived for a period of up to 5 years from the time the undergraduate course was completed.
- Only those courses in which a student earns a "B" or better will qualify towards waiver credit.
- Students must submit an application for admission into the MBA program. Minimum GMAT scores and GPA, as specified by RIT, are required.
- A waiver for the Statistical Analysis for Decision Making graduate course is contingent upon the student passing the statistics portion of the graduate math diagnostic test which is administered during graduate orientation. (*)
